I recently read Psalm 3 in which the Psalmist says "I laid me down and slept, and rose up again, for the Lord sustained me. Who is this, who goes to bed, sleeps soundly and wakes in the morning thoroughly refreshed? Is it some thick skinned character, who drops off without a care for the moment, let alone the next day?



But this person writes poetry, as in Psalm 3. Is it some lucky person who hasn't a care in the world, and life is just perfect But the psalmist

begins 'Lord how increased are they that trouble me; many are they that rise against me. Many there be that say of my soul: there is no help for him from his God'.

Most of us have had sleepless nights certainly I have over recent months. We have gone over and over tomorrows problems in our minds, and they never get any better. We have got up, paced the room, regretted that the night is only half through, maybe we have taken a sleeping tablet, then dozed off, only to wake more weary in the morning than when we went to bed. I wonder if Jesus ever found it impossible to sleep? Did he in the first place learn this secret of sleep from Psalm 3 which he must have known from childhood, and later came to understand and apply to himself? After all the Psalter was his prayer book

WE are not all made alike. Some of us are placid, some are nervous. Is Sleep an index of the kind of persons we are. Is it also an index of the kind of faith we exercise? This is certainly an awkward question and we often try to avoid it. Perhaps we ought to erase Psalm 3 as hopelessly naïve, but that wouldn't be right would it?

Yes we have experienced sleepless nights, but we have also experienced the Lords sustaining power. This is the message of the psalm for us. God sustains those who trust him. We need reminding of this over and over again, for we constantly slip back into the old routine of worry.

Let this be our last thought at night, when we put out the light. That even though all the odds may seem to be stacked against us, Faith in God's sustaining power will see us safely through the dark night, and we will wake safe and refreshed.

Something that you may also like to think on:

You can't change the past but you can ruin a perfectly good future by worrying about the present.

#### THE GLOOPS CLUB FIELD DAY IN SWALLOWNEST 1958



The Gloops Club was started in 1928 by the Sheffield Star and grew to be one of the largest children's clubs in the world and had members in every English-speaking country. Gloops was a jolly, impish little cartoon cat who appeared in pictures in the Star each evening. The motto of the Club was "Smile" and members had to help each other, be kind to animals and birds, and help the sick.

Club activities grew enormously and a large number of District Committees were formed to help in these activities. They opened a Gloops Holiday Home at Mablethorpe that accommodated 60 children each week and many medically unfit children were brought back to health through this home.

Twelve children's hospital cots were installed in Sheffield and the surrounding districts with a gift of  $\pounds$ 3,270 to the hospitals in ten years. Members sent books, toys and comics to sick children in hospital and chocolate eggs at Easter.

A Gloops Silver Cross was awarded for life-saving and brave actions and a Silver Star for distinguished conduct. A Silver Disc was awarded to every Glooper who attended school for three years without being absent. This also applied to Sunday Schools. The Club lasted right up until the 1980s, when it was disbanded. The following is the report in the South Yorkshire Times on Saturday 4th October 1958.

Swallownest Gloops held their annual field day last Saturday in the Church Hall grounds, Swallownest, where there were many side shows, competitions and a film shown by the West Riding Police. The retiring Queen, Miss Janet Trow, handed over £5.10s. (£5.50p) and the retiring captain Terry Havenhand handed over £1.10s.(£1.50p), the results of efforts by the Gloopers.

The new Gloops Queen, Miss Sandra Jones, was crowned by Miss Julie Gray. The attendants were Christine Jones, Margaret Peston, Marilyn Trow, Alison Porrit, Jane Blakemore and Janice Dann and the crown bearer was Hugh Coldwell. The new captain, Master Jack Hattersley, was installed by Mr. Peter Stillier.

The public were entertained by the Hunter's Bar Folk Dancers and the Ordsall Church Hand Bell Ringers. There was a big entry for the third annual baby competition. The judges Mr. Fowler (Rotherham), Sister Fowler (Rotherham) and Nurse Gough (Woodhouse) made the awards:

#### A NEW KID ON THE BLOCK

At my advanced age that is both a strange title to pick and feeling to have! And some visitors to Ulley's services have wondered how it is that I am conducting worship.



I was brought up in the Methodist Church, felt the call to preach when in the 6th form and undertook the selection and training process and began preaching. Circumstances move on and in 2000 a move of home brought the decision to fully join the Church of England, and the congregation at Ulley. As I was too old to be accepted as a Lay leader that also seemed a sensible time to retire from preaching. So I did.

We then spent 15 years moving between two homes one here and the other in France, so the need to preach never raised its head. Once settled back here all the time, and assuming the role of Lay Chair of the Laughton Deanery, I began to be informed about the shortage of clergy and the difficulties that brings in some areas. The question as to whether I should resume leading worship started to become a reality. Finally, at the start of this year, it became a nagging that would not go away, especially as the Diocesan strategy began to unfold. So I sought to meet with Bishop Pete and did so at the end of March.

What sort of reaction would I get was my overriding feeling as we met. An outright rejection? A 'sadly but the rules don't allow it'? Or what? But as we talked he seemed to relax and began to smile and finally he said, "If God is nagging you then, of course you must do it." He, of course, needed to check the rules and I needed to go through the 'safeguarding' process but finally all those things were cleared away and I have the Bishops licence as a Lay Minister to preach throughout the Laughton Deanery.

It's a challenge. Preaching has changed in 20 years! Sermons are shorter! Congregational expectations are different! Everyday language is different! Leading worship certainly is a deal more than dusting off an old sermon and reading it out! It feels like re-learning, re-shaping, re-delivering relevant truths in current modes. It will take time - but it is what I have to do. And if you are in the congregation I hope you will hear what it is that God is truly saying to us.

#### BORN IN YORKSHIRE LOST IN SPACE

I was pleased to meet local man John Brogan recently. He has written a book called "Born in Yorkshire Lost in Space". John is 72 year and describes himself 'a typical Yorkshireman' born and raised in Rotherham. Some years ago he had a brain haemorrhage resulting in the loss of his long and short term memory. His is a great story of recovery and more.

Here is a short excerpt from the part entitled 'The Black Sheep, white boots and a sex scandal to whet the appetite:

'If wi ant ad thee. Wi wud own a row of houses bi na. This was a comment mi Mum would often make when I came in from playing, the arse end of mi trousers ripped out, an the soles of mi shoes hangin' off. Born in November 1946 some 12 years after my elder Brother Peter, "Mummy's favoured one" and 7 years before my younger sister Kathryn "Daddy's little Princess".

I suppose I was the genuine Black Sheep of the family. I did not become aware of this mantle until much later in life, and on reflection, I considered myself an ordinary kid, that lived in Canklow.

[As our local readers will know] Canklow is a Council Estate which gained a reputation, during and after the war years, as a somewhat shady area, with lots of even shadier characters, and generally described by other residents of Rotherham, in polite terms, as 'rough'.

I grew up in Canklow in the 40s 50s and 60s and for me it was home. To me, it was, and as far as I knew, no different to any other area in Rotherham. I

To understand class, rank, rich, poor. As far as I was concerned everyone in Rotherham lived just like me.'

After finding some old photos he popped some of the childhood memories which the photos reminded him of on to social media. The response was amazing. People encouraged John to write the book. The book was published on Yorkshire Day –  $1^{st}$  August.

John tells me 'The journey was not easy, but the results, for me, have been fantastic. My memory is not what it once was, but that could also be due to the ageing process.' John adds that 'There must be more people like me who have a story to tell in their lost memories.'

I think he is right. Let's hear from readers and put a few more in print so do get in touch with me so we can help share them.

Meantime let's not forget that reminiscence, even just some old photos shared are a key way of keeping loved ones with memory problems feeling a full part of the family. A shared local book can also jog memories. John Brogan's is available on Amazon Paperback £7.86 Kindle £2.35.

Around 70 years ago all young men, at 18, were expected, unless they were excused ,to serve in the armed forces for 18 months or 2 years. The actual experiences and activities in which they were involved varied considerably and, for a few, it meant service in a war zone.

That is what it meant for Peter Hutchinson, who had to serve in the United Nation's Korean War, often called the forgotten war! It was very much a roller coaster ride and his account has now been published as '7287 Called Up - A Journey to the Korean War.' It is available in bookshops, on line at £12.99 hardback and £8.99 paperback or contacts Peter direct.

#### Doesn't God want clergy in the North?

Can it be true that God is calling most Anglican clergy to the South of England? Does He really want churches in northern urban areas like Burnley, Wigan, Sheffield and Bury and other post-industrial towns to struggle on with very few clergy?

Well, you might be forgiven for thinking so, when you compare some figures. According to a recent meeting called by the Diocese of Manchester in order for clergy to share best practice and learning, too few clergy are looking North. The Archdeacon of Rochdale, the Ven Cherry Vann, said: "God seems to be calling clergy South for some reason; we are lucky if we get one or two applicants for a post. That's a real indicator of some of the challenges we face."

For post-industrial towns across the Northwest are really struggling. "When you see that even McDonald's has moved out of Rochdale town centre, you get the picture." To put it another way, in Burnley you can buy a three-bedroomed house for  $\pounds 20,000$ .

And if the towns are struggling, the churches are struggling too. "We feel left behind, forgotten and ignored. There needs to be a national strategy for moving clergy up north," said the Archdeacon.

It is long, lasting for eternity.


It is high, coming down from heaven to save us.


