



29 SEPTEMBER: MICHAEL & ALL ANGELS

Michael is an archangel, whose name means 'who is like unto God?' He makes various appearances throughout the Bible, from the book of Daniel to the Book of Revelation. in Daniel, he is 'one of the princes' of the heavenly host, and the special guardian of Israel. In Revelation, he is the principal fighter of the heavenly battle against the devil. From early times, Michael's cult was strong in the British Isles. Churches at Malmesbury (Wiltshire), Clive (Gloucestershire) and Stanmer (East Sussex) were dedicated to him. Bede mentions him. St Michael's Mount in Cornwall was believed to commemorate a vision there in the 8th century. By the end of the Middle Ages, Michael had 686 English churches dedicated to him.

In art Michael is often depicted as slaying the dragon, as in the 14th century East Anglican Psalters, or in Epstein's famous sculpture at Coventry cathedral. Or he is found (in medieval art) as weighing souls, as at Chaldon (Surrey), Swalcliffe (Oxon.), Eaton Bishop (Hereford and Worcester), and Martham in Suffolk. Michael's most famous shrine in western Europe is Mont-Saint-Michel, where a Benedictine abbey was founded in the 10th century.

The 'All Angels' bit of this feast-day was added in 1969 when Gabriel and Raphael were included in with Michael.



SAINT MICHAEL Extract from an Ancient Celtic Poem

Saint Michael, angel of the sea,
Lord of the horses he,
Saint Michael, of the angels king,
Of war, of shepherding;
On steed he flies across the skies;
The first-fruits of the harvest corn,
The first-fruits of the flock-lambs born,
Are his, he meets the soul forlorn.

The saints and angels watch o'erhead,
Their wings and prayers o'erspread:
The righteous ones in heaven wait,
St Peter at the gate;
In might arrayed they shield and aid;
Be with us e'er, archangel powers,
Be with us, angels, life's long hours.



25 SEPTEMBER: ST CEOLFRITH (642-716) Baking & Bibles

Ceolfrith is a good patron saint for anyone who has studied hard for their profession, is strong in the face of tragedy, and who can offer some homely care to others in need.

This well-loved abbot of Wearmouth and Jarrow came from a noble Northumbrian family, and was ordained at Ripon when he was just 27. He travelled to Canterbury and Icanho (in East Anglia) where he studied ecclesiastical and monastic practices. But back at Ripon the monks soon came to appreciate him for another good reason: Ceolfrith was an outstanding cook. They asked him to be the monastery's baker, and he agreed.

In time Ceolfrith was moved on to Wearmouth, and then in 682, when the monastery at nearby Jarrow was founded, Ceolfrith became abbot. It was here that disaster struck, when a plague killed all of the monks who could sing or read. Only Ceolfrith and the boy Bede were left alive.

It would have been so easy to flee that empty house of death, but instead, Ceolfrith and the young Bede faithfully stayed on, because they believed God had called them to be there. Soon Jarrow prospered once more, and by 689 Ceolfrith was made abbot of both Wearmouth and Jarrow.

Ceolfrith seems to have been a kindly and energetic leader. During his rule 600 monks joined the monastery, the library was doubled, and the endowments increased. But Ceolfrith's biggest legacy to history came when he commissioned from his own scriptoria three Pandects (complete Bibles in single volumes) in uncial script. One still survives today, as the Codex Amiatinus, an enormous volume in the Bibiloteca Laurenziana in Florence. It is the oldest surviving complete Latin Bible in one volume

14 SEPTEMBER: HOLY COSS DAY

On Holy Cross Day the Church celebrates the Cross as a symbol of triumph, as the sign of Christ's victory over death. Holy Cross Day goes right back to 14 September 335, and we have the mother of a Roman Emperor to thank for it.

Helena was a devout Christian, and after her son, Constantine, was converted, they agreed that she should travel from Rome to Israel, and seek out the places of special significance to Christians.



Of course, much of Jerusalem had been destroyed by the Romans around 135 AD. But even so, Helena finally located what she believed to be the sites of the Crucifixion and of the Burial (and modern archaeologists think she may well be correct). The sites were so close together that she built one large church over them - the Church of the Holy Sepulchre.

That church, built in honour of the Cross, was dedicated on 14 September 335. The sign of the Cross has been used by Christians since early times. Tertullian, writing his *De Corona* (3:2) around AD 211, noted that Christians seldom did anything significant without making the sign of the cross.

What is its significance? Well, people often put their initials or some sort of personal mark on something to show that it belongs to them. The Cross is the personal mark of our Lord Jesus Christ, and we mark it on ourselves as a sign that we belong to him. Even in the book of Revelation, we read that the servants of God are 'sealed' or 'marked' on their foreheads as a sign that they are His.

A preacher once put it this way: if you were explaining to someone how to make a cross, you would say:

"Draw an I." That is you standing before the Lord, saying, 'here I am'. Then cancel that vertical stroke with a horizontal stroke — as if to say: "Lord, I abandon my self-will and make you the centre of my life instead. I abandon myself to your love and service."

"And when I am lifted up, I will draw all men unto me." (John 12:32)

A sleepy little hamlet in the southern tip of Yorkshire.



On the 4 August 1972 this article appeared in the Sheffield Morning Telegraph.

Once upon a time there was a sleepy little hamlet in the southern tip of Yorkshire, separated from Derbyshire by the River Rother. It stayed that way for hundreds of years and in 1831 the population was only 534. Some claim Thomas Gray's famous elegy was written there. But it isn't sleepy any more. The twentieth century has brought a rude awakening with a busy main road and a seemingly endless stream of traffic flowing continuously through the middle of the village. It is within easy reach of Sheffield, just a few miles from Rotherham with quick access to the M1 Motorway and it just grew and grew and grew.

The hamlet of Estone in the Domesday Book (from the old English word Easton meaning homestead in the east) bears scant resemblance to Aston as it is today. Visitors from those days might recognise parts of the parish church but that is about all. The first church was probably wood and wattle built by the Saxons soon after 627 AD. It was replaced by a Norman building around 1066 and much of this remains still

Vast new housing estates are still in the process of being built and Aston, Swallownest and Aughton merge together until it is difficult to tell one from another. Wimpeys are building 634 houses on their Worksop Road Estate. Over the last four years they have put up 424 and they reckon the estate will be complete in another 18 months. Of those still to be built there are few left unsold. Nearby W Redmile and Sons have built 120 homes with another 100 still to go.

The Clerk to the Parish Council, County Alderman Charles Broughton says a new



road is completed every two or three months. He says this has been the position for the last year or two and the area is now very much a dormitory region for Sheffield and Rotherham as more and more people leave the large towns and cities. The rural peace and quiet of Gray's time has gone, probably for ever. Gray was a frequent visitor to Aston and a great personal friend of the Rector, Rev William Mason.

The Parish Council is quite active. Plans are going ahead on a linear park alongside the Wimpey houses. County Alderman Broughton says they have bought some land from Rotherham Rural Council, some from the church and more from a farmer and trees and shrubs will be planted. People in the village will soon have the use of a new village hall in the Aston Parish which will be officially opening on 22 July for all kinds of function from political meetings to wedding parties.

One of the problems of living in Aston is the main Worksop to Sheffield road, the A57, which virtually splits it in half at peak times. As commuter traffic from nearby villages to Sheffield has increased so has heavy goods traffic especially since junction no 31 on the M1 is just at one end of the village. The A57 Action Group has worked with MP Mr. Peter Hardy, and has succeeded in obtaining a Ministry decision for a by-pass but not before 1980. "The pressure now is to get the date moved forward" say County Alderman Broughton. "There is some conflict over what to do in the meantime."

There have been suggestions for widening and taking the bends out. Some want major street lighting, but then you would have more and more traffic going faster and faster and you might take away the case for a by-pass. It would destroy the rural side of the village." But even without any alterations to the A57 the completely rural atmosphere which once surrounded Aston has now been swamped to a great extent by commuters who spend the evenings and weekends there and the main part of the week in Sheffield, Rotherham and Worksop.

There is little work in the village apart from that provided by farming and a handful of shops. The urban encroachment has already resulted in South Farm, which used to be farmed by Mr. George Payling until recently, being sold and the farmhouse being used as an ordinary residence.

PASSPORTS STOLEN ABROAD

We arrived back at our hired villa on the beautiful north east coast of Corfu after a nice day visiting an historic village (Old Perithia) and having a cool drink with strawberries and cream at Agios Stephanos (Wave Bar). My wife entered the bedroom. 'The safe has gone' were not words I wanted to hear. All that remained were the holes where it had been prized from the wall. The theft of a wedding and engagement ring is the saddest loss. The little cash and some, quickly cancelled, bank cards, creates less of a problem than the disappearance of a mobile phone and passports. Without passports you cannot return. I still had my phone, driving licence, cards and some cash. #Lesson one – keep belongings separate.

The, shocked and surprised, local holiday agents (SuperTravel Corfu) were with us within 10 minutes, abandoning a half day off at the beach. The two young guys Andreas and Spiros were wonderful. They called the Police who arrived minutes later, dressed in paramilitary blue fatigues with enormous 'don't mess with me' black boots and guns. They asked lots of questions and quickly determined that indeed the safe was no longer fixed to the wall and was somewhere else. We followed Andreas and Spiros for an hour to the 'local' Police station - a place so remote that even they required the aid of the statutory elderly Greek man sitting at a shady street corner. He had however traded in his traditional donkey some years ago for a Vesper.

The Policeman was very kind. He interviewed my wife and drew up a statement, reading it back in English. It was emailed off to Athens and the British Embassy. Meanwhile, as it was Friday afternoon, I was informed by the Duty Officer in London that the Vice Consulate in Corfu was shut as was the entire Foreign Office 'Don't book to come home until Thursday or Friday.' 'Our government departments are always open stated the Greeks. That's ridiculous!' We followed Andreas and Spiros back and went out for a very late meal. The owner of 'Nikolas Taverna' (Agri Bay) advised us he would personally kill the thieves. He twisted his apron with such considerable muscular tension that I think it was a genuine speciality of the house. The food in Corfu is almost universally excellent – Nikolas was especially good. We had to stay another four days in a hotel, just outside picturesque Corfu Town. I put on at least a pound each evening. (For great meze try 'Avli')

If your passport is stolen abroad you will need a smart phone to get https://www.gov.uk/emergency-travel-document Just answer the simple questions, upload a photo of yourself looking your very worst, and pay £100 each(!). #Lesson two – take details of the issue dates and numbers on your passports and keep them separate. You must physically collect Emergency Passports from the nearest British Embassy or Consulate. Then you can return home and lose all that extra weight. We will visit Corfu again. It's beautiful, crime is very rare, the food, wine, service and the people are all lovely!



"Oberammergau is a small village in Bavaria, Germany. In 1633 bubonic plague was sweeping through Europe. A man travelling back home to Oberammergau for Christmas brought the plague with him. It spread throughout the village. According to local tradition, a vow was made that if God would spare them, the villagers would perform a play depicting the life and passion of Jesus Christ every ten years. The village was saved from all effects of the plague and the villagers kept their word and first performed the Passion Play in 1634. It has since been performed every ten years."

Death stalked the streets in the Bavarian village As the plague brought havoc, death and despair, Europe was ravaged as millions died, Neither man or woman or child was spared.

They gathered together in desperation
A vow was given – if they could be saved
A play would be made of the Saviour's life
This was the promise the villagers gave.

Miracle of miracles their village survived,
Not one more death their lives had been saved,
So every ten years this Play is performed
To honour the God who had come to their aid.

Prayers were made and the answer came
A heavenly lesson we too can own,
That He who dwells in ineffable light
Is also the One who brings blessings down.






