

SERVICES DURING APRIL 2021



On the Best way to run a Church Council Meeting

My dear Nephew Darren,



Thank you for inviting me to speak at your church council yesterday. I began to suspect that my theme of why Eusebius's dislike of Sabellianism led to his condemnation at the Council of Antioch in 324 was a little misjudged, when the only question I was asked after my lecture was if Eusebius was on Facebook.

I never realised how much technology is needed these days just to discuss church matters. It seemed that everyone had brought their laptop, so they could refer to all the diocesan briefing documents and reports that you mentioned. I've been in the diocese 40 years and have never heard of most of those papers. But then I find it too easy to delete the diocesan mailings, unread, with a click of my mouse.

Our church meetings are far more traditional. Since the church floor seems to have been carved out of permafrost, our meetings circulate round members' houses. This introduces a nice element of competition, as each host tries to outdo the previous one in the baking of cakes. Meetings at Colonel Drinkwater's – a more inappropriate name one cannot imagine – are the shortest, since we are always promised wine once the meeting is over. It is remarkable how unanimity is achieved on every subject within minutes, and nothing appears under "any other business".

Mrs Eddington never troubles us with minutes, largely because she can rarely read the notes she takes. She just shares with us whatever she can decipher at our next meeting. Last month, she accidentally brought her shopping list instead, and so read that out. There followed a lively discussion on whether carrots from our local shop were better than those at the supermarket. When it was found out she intended to use them in a venison casserole, endless recipes were keenly debated.

We always leave our church meetings well fed, up to date with village gossip, and totally untroubled by any church council business. And the lack of any minutes ensures that I can then make all the decisions myself, between meetings. I think you will find our system has much to be commended. Your loving uncle, Eustace



Aston-cum-Aughton in the 1700s

During the 1700s, the population of Aston and Aughton was between 550 and 600. We know this because in the Visitation Return of 1764, Reverend William Mason reported that he had about 115 families in his parish of Aston and Aughton. Multiplying by five gives a population of about 575. The next population record we have is the census of 1841 when it was 700. During the 18th century the inhabitants of Aston-cum-Aughton parish were largely involved in farming. An examination of the parish burial register at the time shows the great majority of the working men in the parish were labourers of one sort or another.

The names of forty different farmers, five husbandmen and eight yeomen were recorded. So, a large number of small farmers, each employing farm labourers and many of the rest of the villagers were employed in trades associated with farming.

We can see six blacksmiths, two whitesmiths, one farrier, five wheelwrights, one horse collar maker, one roper and one cooper. There were also several specialist tradesmen involved in building and maintenance - eight masons, eight carpenters, one joiner, two glaziers, one plumber and two painters.

Another group of trades was more domestic - seven butchers, fourteen shoemakers, six weavers, eight tailors and one mercer. Seven were listed as servants, working for various prominent inhabitants, as well as one schoolmaster, two parish clerks and a bar-keeper; this was a toll bar keeper, not the alcoholic type!

Occupations related to Aston Hall were two coachmen, one steward, one gamekeeper, one park-keeper and one gardener. There was also a connection with the iron industry with three cutlers, a nail maker and a file cutter. There were also six colliers living in Aston, long before the pit shafts at Aston or Fence were sunk. The earliest recorded collier died in 1736. They were probably working in bell pits which we know were dug in the area.

Some villagers had dual occupations. There was a farmer and wheelwright, a carpenter and wheelwright, a tailor and weaver, a farmer and blacksmith.

Some occupations ran in families, four of the masons listed are Duckenfields,

Francis, John, Joseph and Richard and two were James and John Howell. John, William and Francis Memmott were shoemakers, John and Thomas Ryder were tailors and John and Joseph Kesteven were wheelwrights. Farming also ran in families with Stephen and Thomas Birks; George and William Gill; Benjamin, Berry and John Handley; Edmund and James Hobson; George and John Kesteven; Israel and Thomas Marshall and finally, James, Jervas, Thomas and William Whitehead.



IAN WATTS

It is with regret that the PCC has reluctantly accepted Ian Watts' resignation as Director of Music; he will be leaving after Easter. The PCC is very grateful for Ian's valuable contribution to the musical and general life of the church. In particular throughout lockdown when he has provided a huge amount of music for use both on Zoom and in church. We wish him well for his future. The PCC will be considering the future musical needs of the church in the coming weeks.

23 April - St George of the Golden Legend

The Saint of an English Army before he was Patron Saint of England, St George may have been a soldier, but he was no Englishman. Some stories say that he was an officer in the Roman army under Diocletian, who refused to abandon his faith during the Terror, and was martyred at Lydda in Palestine about the year 300 AD – supposedly 23rd April. Over the years St George became the example of a Christian fighting-man, a powerful helper against evil powers affecting individual lives. He was the soldier-hero of the Middle Ages, of whom remarkable deeds were reported.



In the Golden Legend of the 13th century, Jacobus de Voragine gave St George a handsome write-up. The story runs thus:

One day, St George rode up to the heathen city of Sylene in Lybia, where he found the citizens in great distress. A neighbouring dragon had forced them to surrender two sheep each day for its dinner, and when the sheep gave out, two of their children; and now they were about to sacrifice the King's daughter, dressed as if for her wedding. St George encountered the little party by a stagnant lake, where the dragon lived, and persuaded the sobbing Princess to tell him why she was so miserable. At that moment the dragon appeared, looking inexpressibly revolting. St George charged forwards and drove his spear into the dragon's gaping mouth. To everyone's amazement, he tumbled the monster over and over.

Then St George borrowed the Princess's girdle, tied it round the dragon's neck, and persuaded her to lead it back to Sylene herself. The sight of her approaching with the befuddled dragon on its makeshift lead emptied the town. When the inhabitants timidly crept back, St George promised to behead the dragon if they would all believe in Jesus Christ and be baptised.

It was a most effective form of evangelism, for everybody said 'yes' at once. So, 15,000 people were baptised, and four carts were commissioned to remove the dragon's body.

St George thus became a symbol of the war against evil, and he is usually portrayed trampling the dragon of sin under his horse's hoofs. The Crusaders had a vision of him helping them against the Saracens at Antioch, during the first Crusade, and so brought the story of St George back with them from Palestine. Presently England put herself under the protection of the Saint. His day was declared a holiday in 1222. A red cross on a white field is the flag of St George.

Live in Care A Personal Perspective

During 2020 we were faced with a family situation involving an elderly relative, living in another part of the country, whose dementia had developed to the point where it was now unsafe for her to live alone at all. The level of need was a couple of steps beyond the situation where some-

one can be properly supported with a number of visits a day for companionship, home help and personal care. Typically, it would be time to consider care in a nursing home.

As you may already know from past columns our inability to obtain good quality care at home for other family members was one of the motivating factors behind our setting up Home Instead in Rotherham ten years ago. So, this was not something new for us. But the circumstances were new. We have experienced different standards of care home ranging from extremely poor to excellent. In practice, however good a reputation is, you can only tell how good *any* type of care is by maintaining regular visits.

Amongst other things this enables you to see if there are regular staff who appear to really know your relative and to observe how content and well-cared for your loved one is. Is there good attention to detail or not? During Coronavirus, such visits were either severely curtailed or not allowed at all. So, we found ourselves looking at the alternative option of Live in Care, through another branch of the franchise we operate. This opened our eyes to the advantages. We have also now introduced this service in Rotherham.

A fully trained CAREGiver is introduced to the person needing 24-hour support, along with back up support for holidays and time off. You can visit as far as any restrictions allow. You can call them on the phone or via a video link at any time. You can follow their progress on an online log. But what is even better is that a one-to-one relationship is established and the person needing support can stay at home. For us it has been like having a reliable, caring, extra family member, at just the right time.

Your loved one can get up when they want, take as long getting ready as they need, have whatever they want to eat (a very interesting subject sometimes) and watch the TV or go for a walk or even take a trip out – all one to one. What could be better especially if their memory has severely deteriorated and they have other disabilities? Eventually our family member is likely to need nursing care. This gives extra time to consider the options and avoid the potential rush to decide if there is a sudden deterioration. Especially during the last year, we are sure our relative's quality of life has improved.
