

SERVICES DURING JUNE 2021



On getting to church at a social distance

The Rectory St James the Least of All

My dear Nephew Darren,

Since your parishioners mostly live in an area of half a square mile, where their only concern in getting to church is whether to take the underpass, or to risk a dash across the ring road, you may have little understanding of the problems our folk have in travelling our long country lanes to church, especially as we are keeping our social distance from each other.

Several parishioners have decided that they can't possibly share cars even with their own spouses, as in their 15-room homes they have successfully (and in some cases, happily) avoided each other for months. So the lane outside the church has filled up each week with Mercedes nudging Audis, and Land Rovers easing in between Bentleys.

Others arrive on horseback. But they are careless about leaving their horses to graze in the churchyard, and I have had to remind them twice that flowers in memorial vases are not fodder. The horses do help to keep the grass down, but unfortunately our verger now objects to standing outside during Matins, holding the reins of half a dozen horses. He says it is not part of his job description, which only confirms my view that there is entirely too much fuss these days about having job descriptions at all.

Major Crompton's devotion to his new sit-on lawnmower has inspired him to travel to church on it. Since he is unable to uncouple the mowing apparatus, the tarmac on his two-mile drive is acquiring interesting patterns. His drive at two miles per hour along narrow lanes means he arrives leading a procession of cars with drivers given the opportunity to exercise the Christian virtue of patience.

Mrs Pendleton, on the other hand, leads a small but select group from the Mothers' Union who are all keen cyclists. They all arrive on a whoosh of fresh air, their hair in total disarray, but with pink cheeks glowing with health. Nobody in church minds sitting near them, as anyone who can manage to peddle an old three-gear bicycle up the hill to our church is most unlikely to be sickening for anything.

Finally, of course, the majority arrive on foot, having negotiated fields, stiles and assorted cattle on the way. The countryside may well praise God, but one does wish they wouldn't bring quite so much of it into church.





Aston and Aughton in the Deanery of Handsworth. Part 1.

The book "The History of the Parishes and Churches in the Deanery of Handsworth in the Diocese and Archdeaconry of Sheffield", written by the Rev. Alfred Thomas, B.D, Rector of Todwick (published in 1932) is a mine of information about the villages in this area and includes Anston, Aston, Darnall, Gleadless, Handsworth, Harthill, St. Swithun's Sheffield, Thorpe Salvin, Todwick, Wales, Woodhouse and Woodsetts. If you are interested in the history of the villages and their churches, it is well worth a read. You should be able to find it in the local archives in Sheffield and Rotherham.

The chapter on Aston begins at Domesday, where the spelling is Estone. Rev. Thomas writes that there are in the British Isles as many as 60 Astons and 30 Estons, all from the Old English East-tun; tun meaning an enclosure or a homestead.

Aston is written in Kirkby's Inquest of 1284 but in Commonwealth papers it is written Ashton. In the Calendar of Charter Rolls, it is described as Aston-in-Morthing. Morthen is the name of a hamlet in the parish of Whiston, and also of an undefined district in which are situated Aston, Brampton, Laughton and Morthen. The derivation of the word is thought to be Anglo-Saxon; morth, slaughter, and ing, a meadow.

Aughton, an ancient hamlet and manor in the Parish is now generally coupled with Aston as Aston-cum-Aughton. It has passed through the following variations: Actone, Acton, Hacstone, Aghton, Aeyghton, Ayghton, Awgton and Awton, the last one being the pronunciation we now use.

In the Domesday Survey of 1086, the manors of Aston and Aughton are described as follows:

Land of William de Warren.

In Estone there are 1 sokeman and 4 bordars with 1 plough. Pasturable woodland 4 furlongs in length and half a furlong in breadth. In Actone there are 1 sokeman and 3 bordars with 1 plough. Pasturable woodland 1 furlong in length and 2 perches in breadth.

Land of the Count of Mortain.

In Estone, Lepsi had 1 manor of 2 carucates and 2 bovates for geld, and 2 ploughs can be there. Now Richard (de Surdeval) has there 5 villeins and 2 sokeman with 2 ploughs. A Church is there and a priest. Pasturable woodland half a league in length, and as much in breadth. The whole manor is 1 league in length and half a league in breadth. In the time of King Edward the Confessor it was worth 20 shillings. It is now worth 8 shillings.

In Hacstone, Lepsi had 6 bovates and Grim half a carucate, and Lefchil 4 bovates, 3 manors of 1 carucate and 6 bovates for geld; and in the same place 2 sokemen had 1 carucate each for geld. In this land there can be 2 ploughs. Now Richard has there 4 villeins and 3 bordars with 1½ ploughs. Pasturable woodland 1 league in length and 11 furlongs in breadth. The whole manor is 16 furlongs in length and 12 leagues in breadth. In the time of King Edward the Confessor it was worth 40 shillings. It is now worth 10 shillings.

In the Domesday Survey, Aston is the only parish in the deanery where it is stated that there was a Church and a Priest. There was a church at Todwick but there is no mention of a priest. The large depreciation in the values of the Manors between the time of King Edward the Confessor (1042-1066) and the Survey is an indication that the devastation of the Conquest had not been repaired by the time of Domesday Survey twenty years later.

In Kirkby's Inquest, 1284-85, William de Cauntelo held Aston of Thomas Furnival for 1 fee. In the Knights' Fees of 1303, Sir William de Cantilupe held 1 Knight's fee in Aston of de Furnyvall and himself of Geoffey Luterel. William de Cantelo paid 5 shillings for Wapentake fine and 16d. for Sheriff's aid. The interval between Domesday and Kirkby's Inquest was partially bridged over by the family of de Arches. Osbert de Arches presented the first known Rector in 1253-54. His daughter married Sir William de Cantilupe.

Sokeman : A freeman who was free to leave or sell his land, but who owed service to his lord.

- Villein : The highest class of dependent peasantry, often holding between 30 and 100 acres.
- Bordar : Smallholding cottagers of lesser standing than villeins.
- Carucate : As much land as a team of oxen could plough in one season.
- **Bovate** : A peasant holding of between 15 to 40 acres.
- Geld : Anglo-Saxon land tax used for military purposes.

From Poems of the Western Highlanders

9 June - St Columba of Iona

In 563 AD St Columba sailed from Ireland to Iona – a tiny island off Mull, in the Western Highlands. He brought Christianity with him.

Columba (c. 521 -97) was born in Donegal of the royal Ui Neill clan, and he trained as a monk. He founded the monasteries of Derry (546), Durrow (c.556) and probably Kells. But in 565 Columba left Ireland with twelve companions for Iona, an island off southwest Scotland. Iona had been given to him for a monastery by the ruler of the Irish Dalriada.

Why would a monk in his mid-40s go into such voluntary exile? Various explanations include: voluntary exile for Christ, an attempt to help overseas compatriots in their struggle for survival, or even as some sort of punishment for his part in a row over a psalter in Ireland. Whatever the reason, Columba went to Iona and spent the rest of his life in Scotland, returning to Ireland only for occasional visits.

Columba's biographer, Adomnan, portrays him as a tall, striking figure of powerful build and impressive presence, who combined the skills of scholar, poet and ruler with a fearless commitment to God's cause. Able, ardent, and sometimes harsh, Columba seems to have mellowed with age.

As well as building his monastery on Iona, Columba also converted Brude, king of the Picts. Columba had great skill as a scribe, and an example of this can be seen in the Cathach of Columba, a late 6th century psalter in the Irish Academy, which is the oldest surviving example of Irish majuscule writing. In his later years Columba spent much time transcribing books.

Columba's death was apparently foreseen by his community, and even, it seems, sensed by his favourite horse. He died in the church just before Matins, and it is a tribute to this man that his traditions were upheld by his followers for about a century, not least in the Synod of Whitby and in Irish monasteries on the continent of Europe.

Here is a prayer of St Columba:

Christ With Us My dearest Lord, Be Thou a bright flame before me, Be Thou a guiding star above me, Be Thou a smooth path beneath me, Be Thou a kindly shepherd behind me, Today and evermore.
