On how maintaining the Churchyard can lead to turf wars

My dear Nephew Darren,



Consider yourself fortunate that your churchyard consists of no more than a small, paved area, and that keeping it tidy requires ten minutes of picking up discarded takeaway boxes on Sunday morning. Our four acres of grass and randomly placed gravestones absorbs a large portion of the time and energy of half the parish.

By getting different people to adopt sections of the churchyard, the hope was that an element of competition would be introduced; Major Rutherford would never let Admiral Crompton's section look tidier than his and the local farmers would want to show the amateurs that they knew far more about land maintenance.

Sadly, human nature has got in the way – as it invariably does. Miss Timmins has declared her section a nature reserve, so that the cuddly field mice and darling hedgehogs have somewhere to live in. This now means that crossing from her patch to the next feels like crossing from Kew Gardens to the Amazon Rainforest. Two feet high grass and a profusion of dandelions give way to manicured lawn with any weed daring to pop its head above the parapet being beheaded in seconds. Miss T is toying with erecting a fence round her plot, to keep her dear furry friends safe and Sir Horace is threatening to have it electrified, to make sure they do not defile his grass billiard table.

Mr Tremble, a retired health and safety officer, whose well-meaning advice on avoiding accidents is such a burden, is applying to have all the gravestones on his patch levelled, so that no one could be killed by having a fall on them. The fact that this has never happened in 600 years, seems an irrelevance to him. On the other hand, his neighbour spends summer evenings painting his stones with sour milk, in order to encourage lichen. Mr Tremble's warning that some lichens can be quite poisonous have so far fallen on deaf ears.

Sadly, Lady Lipton, while resting from maintaining her plot, tends to stupefy them when she smokes her briar pipe.

The only area which no one dares criticise surrounds the mausoleum of the Luscombes, maintained by the gardening staff of the present Lord. It contains such a collection of rogues and miscreants that parishioners fear their anger at being disturbed may even cross the divide of death.

I hesitate to admit it, but the thought of an area of concrete with a few pizza boxes scattered round does at times hold a certain attraction.

Wesleyan Chapel at Swallownest



This is a report concerning the re-opening of the Wesleyan Chapel at Swallownest that was published in the Eckington, Woodhouse and Staveley Express on Saturday 9th March 1907.

On Thursday 7th March 1907 the Wesleyan Chapel at Swallownest was re-opened after having undergone extensive structural alterations and extensions. The chapel has been closed for several months and the services have been conducted in the Council Schools.

The foundation stones were laid in October last and very rapid progress has been made. The alterations are of a very extensive nature, and the interior of the building has undergone a very material change for the better. The old building served as both chapel and school, having a partition to divide it. The partition has been entirely dispensed with, and now the whole edifice forms the chapel. The seats have been reversed, and a handsome rostrum occupies one end of the building. Plenty of light is now obtained, for the windows have been enlarged and present a very handsome appearance. They are filled with sea green glass, and have a ruby border. The entrance to the chapel has been elevated and the porch enlarged. When viewed from the lobby the chapel appears very handsome and commodious.

The outstanding feature of the extensions, however, is the new wing that has been erected. When it was proposed to make the old school into a chapel it was found that additional room would have to be provided, and so a spacious block was added on the east side of the building. Three sides of the new wing are of brick the fourth being of Ulley stone. On the ground floor are two class-rooms, the upper storey is occupied by a kitchen and a large schoolroom. The school has a membership of about 250 scholars, and there is now ample accommodation for that number. It measures 34 ft. by 22 ft. and the class-rooms are 16 ft. by 18 ft. and 18 ft. by 22 ft. respectively. The larger of the classrooms will probably be divided by a movable partition. The new wing is fitted with large dormer windows. A thoroughly updated heating apparatus has been installed, and everything has been done to make the building warm and comfortable.

The Rev SP Bevan presided at the opening ceremony and there was a very large attendance. Mr W. Hunt handed a key to Mrs AE Aizlewood, who then unlocked the door of the new wing. Speaking on behalf of his wife, Mr AE Aizlewood was very pleased that they had something for future generations. Ample space had ben provided for the young people, and he trusted that they would help as much as possible in the desirable work that was being carried on.

In the chapel an impressive sermon was delivered by the Rev HT Smart (Sheffield). The sermon was then followed by a well-attended tea that was held in the new schoolroom. In the evening a public meeting was held. Mr W Hall Wood, of Sheffield presided and there was a crowded attendance. The speakers included the Revs JH Jones, Superintendent of the Rotherham Circuit, A Bingham (Sheffield), A Newbery (Rotherham), SP Bevan (Treeton), Messrs AE Aizlewood (circuit steward), George Holland and Messrs. John Lomas and Frederick Robinson (secretaries).

The architect is Mr J Platts of Rotherham and Mr W Hunt of Swallownest was the contractor. It is anticipated that the total cost of the extensions will amount to about £900. At the present time the members of the chapel have raised about £250, of which sum about £90 was raised at the stone-laying ceremony.

In August of the same year, A three days' bazaar opened in the Wesleyan New School to raise money towards the £900 cost of the building. So far cash and promises amounted to £400 and they hoped to raise £150 at the bazaar.

15 APRIL : GOOD FRIDAY Jesus and the Thieves on the Cross

Luke's account of the crucifixion (Luke 23:32-43) emphasises the mocking of the crowd, 'If you are the king of the Jews, save yourself' (35,37,39). In their view a Messiah does not hang on a cross and suffer. In considering the two men who were crucified with Jesus, we are also confronted with the issue of how Jesus secures salvation for us.

The words of one of those crucified with Jesus reflected the crowd's taunts: 'Aren't you the Christ? Save yourself and us.' He highlights the question of Jesus' identity: how can He save others, when He cannot save Himself from death? He failed to see that the cross itself was the means of salvation.

So - what kind of Messiah was Jesus?

The other criminal's response in his last moments is a moving expression of faith. When challenging the other man, he spoke of the utter injustice of the crucifixion: 'this man has done nothing wrong.' He perceived the truth that Jesus was indeed the Messiah. In a wonderful picture of grace, 'remember me when You come into Your kingdom', the second thief confessed his guilt and secured Jesus' forgiveness and mercy.

In reply, Jesus promised the man life from the moment of death; 'Today you will be with Me in paradise.' Jesus used the picture of a walled garden to help the man understand His promise of protection and security in God's love and acceptance eternally.

Each one of us has to choose how we react to Jesus on the cross. Do we want Him to 'remember' us when He comes into His kingdom, or not? If you were to die tonight, how confident would you be of going to be with Jesus? 'For Christ died for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God'' (1 Peter 3:18).

17 APRIL : EASTER MORNING the other Mary

As the traditional Easter story is rehearsed again this month, you may notice that there is one name that frequently occurs. It is that of the 'other' Mary – not the mother of Jesus, but Mary of Magdalene, who stood by her at the cross and became the first person actually to meet the risen Christ.

That's quite a record for a woman who, the Gospels tell us, had been delivered by Jesus from 'seven devils' – New Testament language for some dark and horrible affliction of body, mind or spirit. As a result, her devotion to Him was total and her grief at His death overwhelming.



In church history Mary Magdalene became the 'fallen woman' a harlot who was rescued and forgiven by Jesus but there is no evidence to prove she was a 'fallen woman' but the contrast is sublime, Mary the virgin mother, the symbol of purity. Mary Magdalene, the scarlet woman who was saved and forgiven, the symbol of redemption. Surely, we all fall somewhere between those two extremes.

The dark cloud from which she was delivered may have been sexual, we are not told. What we do know is that the two Marys stood together at the cross, the Blessed Virgin and the woman rescued from who knows what darkness and despair. The second great moment for her was as unexpected as it was momentous. She had gone with other women to the tomb of Jesus and found it empty. An angelic figure told them that Jesus was not there, He had risen – and the others drifted off. But Mary stayed, reluctant to leave it like that. She became aware of a man nearby, whom she took to be the gardener. She explained to him that the body of 'her Lord' had been taken away and she didn't know where to find Him.

The man simply said her name 'Mary' and she instantly realised it was Jesus. She made to hug Him, but He told her not to touch Him because His resurrection was not yet complete. She was, however, to go to the disciples and tell them she had met Him. She did – but they wouldn't believe her.

Her words – 'I have seen the Lord' – echo down the centuries, the very beating heart of the Christian gospel.

Ukraine – A very brief history

As the invasion of Ukraine has unfolded, I have turned to the history books for some background context. Like many children fifty years ago I collected stamps. Eastern European ones were considered particularly 'exotic'. You could excitedly look up what country 'Magyar' was in your family's Reader's Digest encyclopaedia. Then you could check out where Hungary was in your atlas or on your globe. But whilst there were stamps for Hungary, Poland and East Germany there were none for Ukraine. This second largest European country had, since 1922, been subsumed into the Soviet Union. Eastern Europe was considered exotic, not because of hot weather and great beaches, but because it was mostly closed to visitors and few of its own citizens were allowed abroad. You were on one side of 'the iron curtain' or the other. This changed when, following the rest of the 'communist bloc', the Soviet Union dissolved in 1991. For Ukraine it marked independence and respite from years of Russian domination.

Ukraine has a long history. The details are still debated by historians. At one time Kjev its capital, just like York and Dublin, was crucial to the trading empire of the Vikings. Norse Sagas call it Kœnugarr. It was strategically positioned on the Dnieper River route to Constantinople. Ukraine's fertile plains of black soil have long been coveted by invaders and occupiers. Ukraine is the world's third largest grain exporter. Greatly increased production in this 'bread-basket of Europe', during the nineteenth century reduced the risk of famine across the whole continent. The early twentieth century found much of the region of modern Ukraine split between the Austrian Habsburg empire and Tzarist Russia which fought each other in World War I. Both empires collapsed resulting in turmoil, crisis, civil war and revolution in Ukraine, with its eventual incorporation within the Soviet Union. Ukraine suffered. That was especially during Stalin's disastrous forced collectivisation of agriculture which caused 'the great famine'. Millions died. It also endured German invasion in World War II. 6 million Ukrainians died including 1.5 million Jews.

The catastrophic Chernobyl nuclear plant explosion of 1986 and its political-economic aftermath was arguably a major cause of the collapse of the Soviet Union. There were alarming pictures of a battle taking place around it shortly after the Russian invasion began. Ukraine was once the World's third largest nuclear weapons state. It gave up its 1700 warheads under the 'Budapest Memorandum' signed by Ukraine, Russia, USA and Britain. They all agreed to '...respect the independence and sovereignty and the existing borders of Ukraine'. At the time of writing, at the end of February, Putin's Russia is invading Ukraine and fierce battles are taking place with much tragic loss of life and dislocation. Over many generations, time has shown the Ukrainians to be an incredibly brave, proud and independent people. That has not changed. They have not wavered. As they resist, our thoughts and prayers are with them. This war is a tragedy for everyone. May it be over soon.
